- 1. What words, phrases or ideas stand out to you from the Bible readings you read today? Why do you think God may be leading you to consider with regard to Jesus being exactly like the God of the Old Testament?
- 2. How do these words, phrases or ideas connect with your everyday life? What do they lead you to think or to do?
- 3. Is the fact that evil exists and that both good and bad things happen an indication that God is not good? Why or why not?

## Respond

Moving forward... On Sunday, Doug quoted Archibald MacLeish who expressed his trouble with the tension of God's goodness through a character in his play, J.B. who asserts, "If God is God He is not good, if God is good He is not God; . . ." As he sees it, God can be good, **or** God can be powerful, but He cannot be both. In your opinion, is that the truth about God? Is this an irreconcilable tension? What might you want to ask Jesus about this?
